Make a recycled bird feeder

Stuff you need:

Plastic drinks bottles Yoghurt pots or milk cartons (make sure they're clean)

Wire or string
Bird seed
Scissors

Step-by-step guide

- Cut a hole in the side large enough to allow a free flow of seeds, but in such a way that it won't all fall out.
- 2. Make some small holes in the bottom so rainwater can drain away.
- 3. Attach some wire or string to the top to hang it.
 - 4. Fill with seed and hang it out
- 5. Make a new one and recycle the old one if it wears out.












Parts of a bird Label the different parts of the stork below.
